


Entry and Facilities:

RAF Marham

RAF Marham's history started with a brief period from 1916-1918 as a Home Defence airfield, a small grass airfield that was home to flimsy biplanes.

The Station was rebuilt in the mid-1930s as a Bomber Command airfield and operated the Wellington, Stirling and Mosquito between 1939 and 1945.

Following a major rebuild in 1945, it has remained operational ever since. Marham was a key airfield throughout the Cold War, operating a number of aircraft types, but its best-known types were the Victor and the Tornado. The Tornado was operational at Marham from 1982 to 2019 and saw extensive operational service.

RAF Marham is now home to the F-35.


